INGERSOLL MUSEUM MARKS TWENTY-FIVE YEARS

"I remember the Ingersoll Museum's opening day like it was yesterday," noted Museum Director Tom Flynn. "It was Saturday, May 29, 1993, and our first visitor was Jean Millholland, then the executive director emerita of the Council



for Democratic and Secular Humanism, as the Council for Secular Humanism was then called." Millholland would be the first of thousands to visit the two-story wooden house in New York's Finger Lakes district, there encountering the story of Robert Green Ingersoll, "the most remarkable American most people never heard of."

With its 2018 season, North America's only freethought museum will have greeted the traveling public each summer and fall for twenty-five consecutive years. There's a silver anniversary banner hanging in the first—and last—room on the museum tour and a silver anniversary conference planned for August 18–19 (see story in this issue).

"To put this into perspective," Flynn observed, "keep in mind that Ingersoll's birthplace was restored twice before, first in 1921 and again in 1954. Each time, it continued to operate for about a decade before interest—and money—ran out. This silver anniversary means that this third 'incarnation' of the Ingersoll Museum has now operated far longer than its two predecessors combined. Better yet, at age twenty-five the current Ingersoll Museum is going strong. With our ongoing Museum endowment campaign nearing the half-way point [see story in this issue –Eds.], there's every reason to expect that the museum will celebrate a thirty-fifth anniversary—and who knows, maybe a fiftieth as well."


FREETHOUGHT TRAIL IS 'RADICALLY' REDESIGNED

Foundational advancements for progress and equality—secularism and freethought, abolitionism and suffrage, and other radical movements—grew and flourished on the same fertile ground in nineteenth-century west-central New York State.

Today, the legacies of such transformational American reformers as Susan B. Anthony, Robert Green Ingersoll, Matilda Joslyn Gage, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Frederick Douglass are honored, and their stories retold, through the 115 historic sites (marked and unmarked) that compose the Freethought Trail, a project of the Center for Inquiry's Council for Secular Humanism.

For 2018, the Freethought Trail website has been radically redesigned. The new Freethought-Trail.org is fresh with gorgeous visuals, simple navigation, and most

INGERSOLL AMONG THE SPIRITUALISTS

You may have heard of a small 1904 booklet purporting to transmit Robert Ingersoll's greetings from the next life, A Message from Robert G. Ingersoll Transmitted by Automatic Writing through a Philadelphia Psychic. (A copy of this rare and idiosyncratic work is in the collection of the Center for Inquiry Libraries.) It would be surprising if this were the only spiritualist work referencing Ingersoll; as paranormal investigator Joe Nickell wrote in 2007, "Ingersoll was a tempting target for spiritualists. Although a confirmed atheist, he had cordial relations with many American spiritualists. His acknowledgment of the 'other side' would have been greatly valued—if believed."



An early twentieth-century spiritualist group chose an audacious name!

THANK ye for your "This An' That,"
I'm muckle pleased dear "Bob;"
I'm vera proud to ken that ye,
Remember Scotland's Rob.
A man maun lee, a man maun dee,
Afore he's kissed by Fame;
It tak's sae mony hard knocks, "Bob,"
To glorify one's name.

Oh! whan a man like ye daur say,
I'm grander than a prince!
I'm glad I turned the poet's crank,
An' gar't the auld kirk wince.
There's ac thing that I didna do,
I wadna tell a lie;
Like ye, I am an artist, "Bob,"
Pen Pictures I will gie.

That wee bit hovel gar't o' clay,
Wad that it's wa's cou'd talk;
Aye mony a sad — sad tale they'd tell,
O' nichts that I did walk
The floor alane, an' greet, an' greet,
Wi' sorrow my saul was pres't;
My heart was aching sairly,
For me there wasna rest.

Auld Fate was hard upo' this chiel,
Nae mercy shaw'd puir Rob;

Robert Burns allegedly "dictated" this message (published 1900) to Robert Ingersoll on Earth. Ingersoll having died in 1899, Burns could have saved himself the trouble and placed a "local call."

Former CFI intern and librarian Mandi Shepp (now librarian at, of all places, the Lily Dale spiritualist community) has shared with us two other examples. Pen Pictures is a 1900 booklet by medium Mina S. Seymour. In it, Scots poet Robert Burns directs a poem of greeting to his admirer Robert Ingersoll. The poetry is florid doggerel, a heavy-handed burlesque of Burns's Scots-dialect style. But the booklet itself suggests that despite being dead since July 21, 1796, Bobby Burns acquired few psychic powers on the "other side"—because

he "chose" to send a message to Ingersoll by "composing" a booklet to be published on Earth in 1900 when Ingersoll had already died on July 21, 1899. (Yes, Burns and Ingersoll each died on July 21. Coincidence? You decide!)

importantly, an even-richer trove of information on the individuals, groups, places, and social movements that made nineteenth-century west-central New York State such a flashpoint of progressivism and radical reform.

Deeply researched and painstakingly organized, the new Freethought Trail website is a way to delve into another era, to be enlightened by historical scholarship and surprised by the discovery of facts and stories too seldom told.

ENDOWMENT UPDATE

The Ingersoll Museum endowment fund stands at \$182,963.67—up \$38,444.83 from last year. "This pace of growth in endowment giving brings us closer to the path toward the fund's target of \$400,000," said Museum Director Tom Flynn. "But we have yet to reach the half-

way point." With a \$400,000 endowment, the Museum could meet its routine operating costs from investment income and would no longer require subsidies from the Center for Inquiry.

Shepp also sent us a page from what appears to be a national directory of psychic practitioners, undated but surely early twentieth century, showing that a Chicago Spiritualist group had named itself after Ingersoll. Its pastor, Chief Rheamount, was a regionally prominent Native American medium and medical quack active between 1900 and 1930 or so. **

The Ingersoll Museum's Silver Anniversary Celebration will be held on August 18–19—one week after Robert Ingersoll's birthday—at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in downtown Syracuse, New York. The weekend event includes one day of lecture presentations and one day touring key Freethought Trail sites via luxury motor coach.

The event is underwritten in part by a generous grant from the James Hervey Johnson Charitable Educational Trust, making possible an exceptionally low registration fee of \$105. That price includes the lectures, the motor coach tour and all meals except the Saturday banquet (\$65 additional), which includes the keynote address. Bestselling author and scholar Susan Jacoby will deliver the evening keynote address, "Reason Embattled in a Culture of Lies: Why Robert Ingersoll Wouldn't Recognize Trump's America."

The event also spotlights the Freethought Trail, which celebrates west-central New York State's unique contribution to a spectrum of nineteenth-century radical reform causes including abolitionism, woman's rights, and freethought.

On Saturday, August 18, presentations will feature experts in each of these areas of history.

On Sunday, August 19, attendees will board luxury motor coaches to visit Freethought Trail sites that embody three principal reform traditions:

Freethought: The Robert Green Ingersoll Birthplace Museum (Dresden), a coanchor of the Freethought Trail; Woman's Rights: The Matilda Joslyn Gage Center (Fayetteville), a coanchor of the Freethought Trail; and Abolitionism: The Gerrit Smith estate, home of the philanthropist whose gifts helped fund abolition work in New York State, and the National Abolition Hall of Fame (both Peterboro).
